Communion Before Confirmation

I recently received an inquiry about the link between Holy Communion and Confirmation, and whether or not it was necessary for a child to be confirmed in order to receive Holy Communion. I did not need to make up much of an answer here, because there are some notes in a book called the *Agenda*. The *Agenda* contains a large amount of rites which are used less frequently than the ones in the Lutheran Service Book hymnal. The hymnal contains Holy Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Matrimony, and Funeral. These are the big four that you'll go through during the course of your Christian life. The *Agenda* has dozens of other rites, such as Installation of Officers or Excommunication from the Holy Christian Church. It also has a rite for First Communion Prior to Communion. Each rite has a series of introductory notes. Here are the relevant and helpful notes:

"First Communion Prior to Confirmation: General Notes

- 1. This rite is intended to be used to admit to the Lord's Supper baptized children who have not yet been confirmed. Candidates for admission to the Lord's Supper have learned the Ten Commandments, the Creed, and the Lord's Prayer. They have received careful instruction in the Gospel and Sacraments. Confessing their sin and trusting in their Savior, they desire to receive the Lord's Supper for the forgiveness of their sins and the strengthening of their faith in Christ and their love toward others.
- 2. Concerning the worthy reception of the Lord's Supper, the Small Catechism teaches: "That person is truly worthy and well prepared who has faith in these words: 'Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins.' But anyone who does not believe these words or doubts them is unworthy and unprepared, for the words "for you' require all hearts to believe."
- 3. Baptized Christians are admitted to the Sacrament when they have been examined and absolved by their pastor in accordance with the practice outlined in the Augsburg Confession (Article XXV)." Lutheran Service Book: Agenda; Concordia Publishing House, 2006. P. 25.

We must never be haphazard or careless with admission to the Lord's Supper. It is not our supper, but the Lord's, so His word and will goes. Confirmation is not a requirement for receiving Communion, nor is it an automatic qualification. It is a convenient shorthand phrase for what you might believe, but it is not the last word when it comes to whether or not you are meant to be at the Table. Our goal is to commune every last person on the face of the earth in the way that the Lord would have them come.

One of the primary ways that I know you, as your pastor, is through the giving, and sharing, of Holy Communion. I might notice that your child seems particularly attentive at the rail, and ask questions about their desire to receive Communion. Encourage their curiosity! Answer their questions! Teach them that this is Jesus' Body and Blood for the forgiveness of our sins! Let the little children come to me! Confirmation is also very important, as it continues a child's personal involvement in the church, bringing them to the public confession of the Faith. Confirmation as a requirement for Communion emerged in the Lutheran churches in the 18th century. Others have studied this more than I have, particularly Pastor Mark Surburg. A quick google of his

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name and "confirmation" will direct you to quite a voluminous amount of information if you're interested in the fascinating history of Confirmation.


