Do Stuff Here

One of the neat things about being in a church is that you can do more stuff with other people than you can on your own. This is why we are part of a synod. A few thousand congregations working together can do things like send missionaries and operate seminaries to train pastors. The same thing goes for our congregation. You could try to do this on your own, but it would be better with other Christians. Jesus calls you to be part of His body, the church, and He has called you to be part of this church, Zion. It might sound crazy, but you are baptized to be a part of this very congregation. The church is not an abstract concept, but a physical place with real people.

I've often struggled to convince people to take ownership of their church. If you're new here, you might not feel like you've got much of a voice. You've probably been here longer than you think you have. Do you feel much of a sense of ownership here? I've struggled to find a way to talk about this sort of thing. The church has usually talked about stewardship rather than ownership. What's the difference?

A steward cares for something that belongs to someone else. An owner is completely responsible for the thing. You do not own this church. This church is Jesus Christ's. (He's the boss, I only work here.) You've been called to take care of this place that Christ has established to give His gifts of Word and Sacrament. This place is a fortress of Light in a world of darkness.

Financial crises in the church are no new thing. In fact, I've never been employed by a church that had a positive cash flow. Zion is in a pretty severe financial situation right now. I'm not the money guy here, and will leave it to others to tell you exactly what the numbers are, but it's not good. This is important, because you need to steward the church that you've been called to care for. Your church needs you to do stuff, or it will not exist. The gates of hell will not prevail against *the* church, but congregations do close all the time.

There's some basic things we need you to do: 1 - Come to church. This is your primary duty as part of Zion. 2 - Tithe. Support your church with your money. 3 - Do stuff. Yes, sign up to do stuff! The lawn is not going to mow itself, and the offerings aren't going to count themselves. Vacation Bible School is also not going to teach itself. We need you to commit to doing stuff here.

I'm not here to nag you. God loves a *cheerful* giver. If you don't want to do stuff, then we won't. It isn't a good way to run things. I'm also sure that you know these things already, and I'm not giving you anything new here. You should be aware though, that no one else is going to do the things that we need *you* to do. The world needs this church, and this church needs you, now more than ever before. No, I will not nag you, but I will help you to find the joy that Jesus has given us in the stewardship of this place, and of one another.

God calls parents to provide for their children and raise them in the fear and admonition of the Lord.


