God Does Not Hate You

"You have mercy on all, O Lord, and abhor nothing you have made. You look past the sins of men that they may repent. You spare them all because you are our Lord, our God."

- Introit for Ash Wednesday

It is easy to think of God as angry. Plenty of art shows Jesus frowning at us. The Father is shown as a cranky old man with a huge beard, ready to shout "get off my lawn!" at all of us children who are just trying to have fun. Additionally, we might think that because we can't really do what He's given us to do, particularly in the Ten Commandments, that God must be perpetually angry at us, and even might hate us. And so, every year, on Ash Wednesday, we are reminded that the Lord despises nothing that He has made. Ashes are placed upon your forehead, and you are reminded of who you actually are. You are dust, and dust is created. The Lord does not hate the things that He has created. He does not hate you. God does not hate you.

So why do we feel so badly about God? That's your sin. Your sin does not turn God against you, but it turns you against God. He does not hate you, but your sin causes you to hate Him. Adam and Eve hid themselves from the Lord after they'd realized what they'd done. The Lord did not initiate this hiddenness. He walked plainly in the cool of the garden! Yet, they hid. Their sin caused them to hide from the Lord. Their arrogance caused them to hate their Creator. And yet, the Lord did not hate them. The curses of Genesis 3 are not even so much given from the Lord, but are the consequence of man turning his back upon the Lord and His ways. What is the Lord's solution to man's sin? He will put enmity between the serpent and Eve's Child. Eve's child will crush the serpent's head, putting an end to the rebellion of all mankind. In the promise given, the serpent's ancient power is already stripped.

The next time you feel anger towards the Lord, ask yourself whether or not your particular affliction is a result of our general fallenness or your own sin, or of His anger and hatred. Our world can be a tremendous spiral of suffering, and much of it is brought on by our own bad behavior. Something that someone else does can cause immense pain and grief for you, even though you may have done nothing. That is how the world is. Yet, He still loves it. He does not hate the world. God does not hate you. Instead, He is redeeming the whole thing, and has done so in the death and resurrection of Jesus. God is love. Our repentance does not earn His favor or love, but rather returns us to where He has always been, waiting for all of His children to come home again.

Ash Wednesday is said to be a day of repentance for the things done wrong. In Psalm 51, David confesses his sin that he had covered up committing adultery with Bathsheba. He speaks of accepting responsibility for the sin, and asks God for mercy and forgiveness of his sins. "Have mercy on me, O God, according to your unfailing love; according to your great compassion blot out my transgressions. Wash away all my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin. For I know my transgressions, and my sin is always before me. Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight; so you are right in your verdict and justified when you judge".

David puts everything out in the open and asks God for a clean heart. "Create in me a pure heart, O God and renew a steadfast spirit within me. Do not cast me from your presence or take your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation and grant me a willing spirit, to sustain me". Psalm 51:10-12

Sweeping things under a rug isn't going to magically have them go away. When you go to God and ask for forgiveness and mercy, he will restore you and put you back on the right path. David is transformed by God's forgiveness, thus leading him to teach others about mercy. He then went on to do great things. Why not you?

STEWARDSHIP

We are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts, the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God, those that pertain to this body and life. In other words, it reminds us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every desire of our flesh but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

The easiest example of this is fasting. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned. You have, though, learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above in order to do it.

There is another example of this. It is alms-giving. This is an increase in giving to the church and its mission during this time. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is in leading you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

"But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs." (1 Tim 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season.

Many thanks to Lou Creager, a member of Central Lutheran, for volunteering his time and skills to help clients with automobile problems. Lou came to us with this desire to help people with car troubles, and could we refer names to him. Our first case for Lou was from the Child in Transition Program of the Anchorage School District - a working mom whose father wasn't able to get her son to special classes because his vehicle wasn't working. We hear from CIT that this young student hasn't missed a day since Lou replaced a fuel shut off switch that cost \$59.00. So we now have a list of vehicles needing fixing, and Lou is looking for anyone that would be able to help. If interested, please let us know and we will get you in touch with Lou. Also, many thanks to those who have donated financial help for auto parts.


